

Admission arrangements for the Scarborough and Ryedale area

The Scarborough and Ryedale area includes the towns of Filey, Helmsley, Malton, Norton, Pickering, Scarborough and Whitby, and the rural areas surrounding those towns. It stretches from Speeton in the south (which borders on the East Riding of Yorkshire council), to Warthill in the south west (which borders the City of York Council), to Staithes, Danby and Castleton in the north (which borders on the Redcar and Cleveland council), and Ampleforth and Helmsley, in the west. **See the map on page 3.**

Secondary schools in the local area:

Filey area

Filey School serves children living in the areas covered by Filey Church of England Infant, Filey Junior, Hertford Vale Church of England Primary, Hunmanby Primary and Sherburn Church of England Primary schools.

Ryedale area

Lady Lumley's School serves Pickering Community, St. Joseph's Roman Catholic, Rosedale Abbey and Thornton Dale Church of England Primary Schools, including some areas served by Sinnington Community Primary school.

Malton School serves Amotherby, Foston Church of England, Hovingham Church of England, Malton, St. Mary's Roman Catholic, Slingsby, Terrington Church of England and Welburn Community Primary schools.

Norton College serves Langton, Leavening, Luttons, Norton, Rillington, Settrington All Saints Church of England, Weaverthorpe Church of England and West Heslerton Church of England Primary schools.

Ryedale School serves Gillamoor Church of England, Helmsley, Kirkbymoorside, Newton, St. Benedict's Roman Catholic and St. Hilda's Ampleforth Church of England Primary Schools, including some areas served by Sinnington Community Primary School.

Sixth form courses are currently provided at Malton School, Lady Lumley's School, and Norton College.

Huntington School (City of York Council) serves Sand Hutton Church of England Primary School and Warthill Church of England Primary School. This is the normal secondary school for pupils living in the areas served by Flaxton, Harton, Bossall, Claxton, Sand Hutton, Buttercrambe, Upper Helmsley, Gate Helmsley, Warthill and Holtby.

Scarborough area

George Pindar Community Sports College is a trust school. The school serves Braeburn, Cayton, Overdale and Seamer and Irton Primary Schools areas, and also some areas served by Wheatcroft Community Primary School (the Cornelian area, Sea View area and parts of Osgodby and Filey Road from St. Michael's Lane to Osgodby Lane). If you live in this area, you will have the option of George Pindar Community Sports College as well as the Graham and Raincliffe schools.

George Pindar Community Sports College Admissions policy for the academic year 2010/11

MAL 200 per year group

All Governing Bodies are required by section 324 of the Education Act 1996 to admit to the school a child with a statement of special needs that names the school. This is not an

oversubscription criterion. This relates only to children who have undergone statutory assessment and for whom a final statement of special educational needs (SEN) has been issued.

If the number of applications exceeds the Maximum Admission Limit (MAL), after the admission of children where the school is named in the statement of special educational needs (SEN) the following oversubscription criteria will apply:

Order of priority

Priority group 1

Children and young people in Public Care for whom the school has been expressed as a preference.

Notes

This applies to all looked-after children, including those who are in the care of another local authority.

Priority group 2

Children the Governing Body believes have special social or medical reasons for admission.

Notes

*We will only consider applications on social or medical grounds if they are supported by a professional recommendation from a doctor, social worker, or other appropriate professional which says that it is essential for your child to go to this school **and no other**. A panel of professionally qualified people will consider the reasons given under this priority.*

Priority group 3

Children living within the normal area of the College.

Priority group 4

Children living outside the normal area of the College.

Children in higher numbered priority groups will be offered places ahead of those in lower numbered priority groups and applications within each priority group will be considered equally (i.e. all applications, regardless of order of preference) unless a tie break is needed.

Tie-break:

If there are not enough places for all the children in one of these priority groups, we will give priority first to those with brothers or sisters at the College in September 2010 (in all cases brothers and sisters would include stepbrothers and stepsisters living at the same address) and then to those living nearest the College.

If within a priority group there are not enough places for all those with brothers or sisters at the College in September 2010, we will give priority to those children with brothers or sisters living nearest the College.

Distance measurements are based on the nearest walking route that a child can walk with reasonably safety, accompanied as necessary. We make the measurements using an electronic mapping system. This distance is measured from the ground floor level entrance of the home to the student entrance gate of the College.

We (or the Local Authority) may be able to meet your preference for a place at a school that does not serve the local area you live in. In this case you will normally be responsible for travel arrangements and the costs of your child's travel to and from College.

Graham School and Raincliffe School

serve the town area of Scarborough, and the area served by East Ayton Community Primary School. The town area is normally served by Friarage, Gladstone Road, Hinderwell and Wheatcroft Community Primary Schools, including part of the areas served by Barrowcliff Community Junior, Newby and Scalby Primary and Northstead Community Primary schools.

During the autumn term of the school year in which children reach the age of 11, we will invite you to give us your preference, in order of priority, between these two schools. If there are more applications for one school than there are places available, the criteria shown on **page 7 of the summary guide** will apply.

Local arrangements – Graham and Raincliffe schools

For priority group 3 applications (that is, children living within the normal area covering both schools), priority will be given as follows:

- a) Children living in the area normally served by East Ayton Community Primary School and the area west of Scalby Road from Lady Edith's Drive to Scalby Beck.
- b) Children who will have an older sibling at the school of their choice.
- c) Children who live nearest to the school of their choice.

Scalby School mainly serves the northern part of the town of Scarborough, the village of Scalby, and the villages to the north and west, except for East and West Ayton. It serves Brompton and Sawdon, Hackness Church of England, Lindhead, Snainton Church of England and Wykeham Church of England

Primary Schools area, including parts of the normal areas of Newby and Scalby Primary, Barrowcliff Community Junior and Northstead Community Primary schools.

If there are more applications than there are places available, the authority's normal criteria will apply (**see page 7 of the summary guide**).

Local arrangements – Scalby school

For priority group 4 applications (that is, children living outside the normal area of the school), priority will be given to children who live in the areas normally served by East Ayton Community Primary School and the area west of Scalby Road from Lady Edith's Drive to Scalby Beck (these areas were previously part of Scalby school's 'catchment area' which was revised in 1977) and who:

- a) will have an older sibling at Scalby School at the start of the term when the younger sibling starts school; or
- b) would have to make the longest journey to another school without them becoming eligible for help with travel costs from us under the local authority transport policy.

St. Augustine's Roman Catholic School is a voluntary-aided school open to children baptised as Roman Catholics and children of other religions who live in any part of the Scarborough and Ryedale area. Admission arrangements are explained in the school's brochure, which you can get from the school or can be found on **page 24** of this guide, further details of this school can also be found on **page 40**.

Post-16 education

Post-16 education for students living in the Filey and Scarborough areas is provided at

Scarborough Sixth Form College and the Yorkshire Coast College. These colleges are now independent of direct local authority control. You can get details of courses and admission information from the following.

Whitby area

Caedmon School mainly serves the West Cliff area of Whitby and the coastal area to the north of Whitby as far as, and including, Staithes. It includes the areas served by Airy Hill, Lythe Church of England, Oakridge, St. Hedda's Roman Catholic, St. Hilda's Roman Catholic, Seton, Stakesby and West Cliff Primary Schools, including Ruswarp Church of England (pupils who live to the west of the river Esk) and Sleights Church of England (pupils who live to the west of the river Esk).

Eskdale School mainly serves the area of Whitby east of the river Esk and the area of the Esk Valley to the west of Whitby. It includes the areas served by Castleton, Danby Church of England, East Whitby, Egton Church of England, Fylingdales Church of England, Glaisdale, Goathland,

Hawkser cum Stainsacre Church of England, Lealholm, St. Hedda's Roman Catholic and St. Hilda's Roman Catholic Primary Schools, including Ruswarp Church of England (pupils who live to the east of the river) and Sleights Church of England (pupils who live to the east of the river) primary schools.

Whitby Community College

Children from Caedmon and Eskdale Schools transfer to Whitby Community College which provides education for children aged 14 to 19.

St. Augustine's School, Scarborough – admissions policy 2010/2011

St. Augustine's School is a voluntary-aided Catholic school serving the coastal area from Whitby to Bridlington and inland to Pickering. Through a holistic approach to education, and in a caring environment, it encourages the development of each pupil's full potential within the framework of the teaching of the Gospel and the Church.

This policy was revised in March 2009. The policy will be reviewed by the governing body in March of each year and submitted to the local authority by April 15 of each year. This review reflected the demands of the school admissions code (February 2009), and the guidance from Middlesbrough Diocese (September 2007).

Children who have a statement of special educational need which names our school will be admitted to the school.

The maximum admissions limit for year 7 entry in September 2010 will be 96.

Over-subscription criteria

Where there are insufficient places available to meet all parental preferences, the board of governors has adopted the following over-subscription criteria for admission to St Augustine's school. In order for governors to apply the over-subscription criteria, it is necessary for parents to produce the following evidence where relevant:

Certificate of baptism**Priest/Minister statement**

(Baptismal certificates or notification of baptism may be obtained from the parish where a child was baptised. The procedure is to give the child's full name, date of birth, the names of the parents and the approximate date of baptism when you request the certificate. A stamped, self-addressed envelope should be included.)

Please note that if parents do not supply this information within the timescale given, this may adversely affect your application.

Priority will be given to applications in the following order:

1. Children who are looked-after children (children in the care of a local authority).
2. Children who are baptised Catholics, evidenced by the production of a baptismal certificate or notification of baptism, who attend Catholic primary schools in the coastal Deanery, Pickering and Bridlington.
3. Children who are baptised Catholics, evidenced by the production of a baptismal certificate or notification of baptism, attending other Catholic schools.
4. Children who are baptised Catholics, evidenced by the production of a baptismal certificate or notification of baptism and have a brother or sister¹ in the school at the time of admission.

5. Children who are baptised Catholics, evidenced by the production of a baptismal certificate or notification of baptism, who attend non-Catholic primary schools.

NB In the event of there being more Catholic applicants than places, then a higher test of practising Catholic may be employed² – (guidance on admissions, Middlesbrough Diocese, September 2007)

6. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a fortnight, and have a brother or sister¹ in the school at the time of admission*.

7. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a fortnight, and attend a Catholic primary school*.

8. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a fortnight, and attend a voluntary-aided Christian primary school*.

9. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a fortnight, and attend other primary schools*.

10. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a month and have a brother or sister¹ in the school at the time of admission*.

11. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a month, and attend a Catholic primary school*.

12. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a

Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a month, and attend a voluntary-aided Christian primary school*.

13. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and practising members of a Christian denomination, and who attend church at least once a month, and attend other primary schools*.

14. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and are supported by a copy of their baptism certificate but do not attend church, who have a brother or a sister¹ in the school at the time of admission.

15. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and are supported by a copy of their baptism certificate but do not attend church, who attend a Catholic primary school.

16. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and are supported by a copy of their baptism certificate but do not attend church, who attend a voluntary-aided Christian primary school.

17. Children of other Christian denominations, who are baptised and are supported by a copy of their baptism certificate but do not attend church, who attend other primary schools.

18. Other children.

**To meet these criteria, a baptism certificate and testimony of church attendance from the Minister must be in evidence. A testimony form can be found in the school prospectus or from the school office.*

Tie-break

In the event of a tie-break then distance measured from the school entrance to the front door of the child's home, or in the case of a flat, the main entrance to the building from the street, door to door will be the determining factor. This will be calculated using Google Earth.

Late and casual applications

Late applications and casual applications will be considered against the school's admission arrangements. Local authorities publish an annual timetable which defines when they must receive common application forms. Applications received after this date will be considered 'to be late applications', and will be considered after applications received by the published date.

Additional notes

The admissions policy criteria will be applied on an equal preference basis. St. Augustine's, in line with the admissions code, operates an 'equal preference' system in relation to all preferences for schools. This means that all applications for school are assessed according to the admissions criteria, without reference to the order that the schools have been listed on the application form.

Home address

It is the parental address which will be used in applying the admission criteria. This means that, when stating your choice of school, you should give the parental/guardian address at the time of application. Where a child lives with parents with shared responsibility, each for part of a week, the home closest to school will be the determining factor. The address of childminders, or other family members who may share in the care of your child, should not be quoted as the home address.

Application

An application for admission must be made on the form provided by the local authority and returned to them by the stated date. Places will then be allocated by strict application of the above criteria, with no reference to the date of application. Parents will be notified as to

whether or not their child has been allocated a place during the first week of March, of the year of intake.

Right of appeal

Parents who are refused a place have a statutory right of appeal. Further details of the appeal process are available by writing to the chair of governors at the school address.

Waiting lists

If your child has been refused admission, a waiting list is available where priority will be given according to the above criteria based on the information provided at the time of application. Children will remain on the list for the duration of their school life in 11-16 education, unless a place becomes available or a parent/guardian asks that the child be removed from the list.

Transport

Transport to school, please refer to the summary guide.

Notes

1. brother or sister

The term 'brother or sister' refers to children living permanently as part of the family unit at the same address. A family unit consists of children and their parents/carers. The term parent/carer includes any person who is the birth parent, person with the parental responsibility, special guardianship or who has care of the child

2. Higher test of practising Catholic

Children who attend mass more than twice per month would take preference over;
children who attend mass less than twice a month would take preference over; children who do not attend mass. This would be evidenced by a statement from the priest.
